While watching the interactive documentary 'survey' questions pop up on the lower side of the screen, asking questions relating to the theme of the documentary, questions such as: "Have you ever experienced bullying?" "Yes, No, sometimes Never" are the possible answers the viewer may click to answer the survey. Upon clicking an answer the viewer is lead to a video of a University professor speaking on the topic of the question, they share statistics of how Australians across the nation have answered this question.

This interactive tool puts the viewer in making them feel like they are not alone, being assured by a professor on an outstanding issue can be very comforting, but that being said the viewer can also ignore the 'survey' question all together and continue on their way. It is up to the viewer, the freedom of their documentary is all in a click.
