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EXPLORING TRANSITIONS: RUBRIC

 In this elective, students explore and analyse a variety of texts that portray the ways in which individuals experience transitions into new phases of life and social contexts. These transitions may be challenging, confronting, exciting or transformative and may result in growth, change and a range of consequences for the individual and others.

EXPLORING TRANSITIONS: RUBRIC

 Through exploring their prescribed text and other related texts of their own choosing, students consider how transitions can result in new knowledge and ideas, shifts in attitudes and beliefs, and a deepened understanding of the self and others. Students respond to and compose a range of texts that expand our understanding of the experience of venturing into new worlds.

Ways Individuals Experience Transitions

Billy

- Accidentally supposed to pass on the keys
- □ Voluntarily makes the decision to continue ballet despite disapproval
- Independently seeks out knowledge on ballet and practises his skills
- father and the unknown

Jackie

- ☐ Accidentally discovers that Billy is undertaking ballet
- ☐ Resistance attempts to thwart Billy's plans
- □ Crowing weariness matched with Billy's determination
- Acceptance of his role as father which is to push Billy to his potential and recognises awareness of Billy's growing independence

Challenging or Confronting Transitions

Billy

- Risking disapproval of father figure Billy commences with fear of disappointing father but realises that he cannot resist his natural talent. Does he have a choice?
- Risking humiliation there is no certainty that he will succeed so transgressing could have dire consequences

Billy

- Inciting more conflict Billy realises that his desires may not be a priority given the parallel conflict of miner's strike
- Understanding others and the world – the high brow culture of ballet confronts with his working class background

Challenging or Confronting Transitions

Jackie

- be the moral, emotional and physical support for his sons in a time of economic crisis
- Coping with grief he is forced to deal with the loss of his wife and she appears to have been a key figure in all their lives

Jackie

- Coming to terms with a new world order – the mining industry is facing collapse and failure and that has been all he has ever known
- Acceptance of son's choices
 - parents have plans for sons
 and when that is challenged
 it may feel that the son is
 rejecting what they stand for.

Exciting or Transformative

Billy

- Sense of achievement –
 Billy's persistence and
 resilience in the face of
 disapproval. Changing a
 community's perspective?
- ✓ Difference/Individuality —
 recognising that different
 could mean 'special' and not
 necessarily negative

Jackie

- ✓ Strengthening relationship with his sons acceptance of Billy's decision drew the family and community together.
- ✓ Empowering oneself

 through change loss of control in family and job has now turned into empowerment on one level.

Growth/Change for Self and/or Others

BILLY

- Moved from dependence to independence
- Moved from uncertainty to a state of certainty about his passions and desires
- Instigated the change in his family and broader society

JACKIE

- Moved from a state of powerlessness to a state of empowerment
- Developed awareness of his son as an independent person
- Recognised that he does not want to pass on the struggles of his world to his sons

Transitions result in new knowledge and ideas

- ✓ Knowledge of ballet the development of skills brings with a sense of confidence and a reinvigoration of purpose – this is what I was meant to do!
- ✓ Knowledge of father's love emotional- the father's sacrifice and consequently Tony's assistance, reinforces the awareness that this used to be a tight-knit family and that support can restore this familial harmony
- ✓ Knowledge of the threat of economic change the town and its inhabitants learn that they are not protected/sheltered from the broader governmental and societal reforms and that if they do not adapt they will become metaphorical 'dinosaurs'

Transitions result in shifts in attitudes and beliefs

- ☐ Gender expectations 'only girls do ballet' and Michael's cross-dressing
- □ Ballet dancers can originate from hyper-masculine contexts and do not have to originate from high brow environments
- □ Independence does not have to threaten a family or a relationship; it can create pathways for growth and bonding.
- □ Society changes when an individual tests the limit

Transitions result in deepened understanding of self and others


- Individuals do have the strength to persist in the face of insurmountable obstacles
- *People are resistant to change because they fear leaving their comfort zones and the uncertainty that change brings.
- *People want to conform because they believe that brings them safety/protection; sometimes we need to rebel to instigate transformation in others and aspire to our dreams
- Unconditional support does not always come easily; sometimes we have to create avenues/opportunities for people to extend their support to our dreams/aspirations

Billy is forced into boxing — expectation of family and community




Billy is caught between the world he is curious to enter and world of expectation



Montage of Expression — I can't say what I feel so let me dance it for you




The metaphorical wall — the family has to transition before the society can transition

You force others to transition with you — they are forced out of their comfort zones — growth does not have an age limit




Girl, symbolic of society, watches uncertainly as Billy lays one on Michael
